Notes from Father Jeffrey Clawson

Much is happening at St. Anselm, and in the Episcopal Church, ranging from issues of law to renovation and repair of the church buildings.

Reconfiguration of the Sanctuary

Baptism and the Holy Eucharist are the two principal sacraments of the Episcopal Church. We have a beautiful altar emphasizing the importance of the Eucharist; now, with alterations that have been made, our baptismal font will emphasize more adequately the importance of baptism. The glass has been removed between the vestibule and the nave and four rows of pews were removed to open up the space and bring the baptismal font into the main space of worship. The newly configured space will be ready for the celebration of the Feast of Pentecost on Sunday, June 8. On this day we will renew our baptism vows and there will be a Thanksgiving Over the Water. It will be a wonderful way to celebrate our life in Christ and to celebrate that God is calling St Anselm to a new life through baptism and Holy Eucharist.

The design and work of renovating was done by Chenh Nguyen of the Vietnamese congregation. He is completing his degree in Construction Engineer Management at California State University, Long Beach. Chenh Nguyen also recently constructed the elegantly-designed trellis in the labyrinth garden. Many thanks to Chenh for making our lovely church even more beautiful.



Pastoral Letter

Bishop J. Jon Bruno's letter of Sunday, May 11 was read to all congregations within the Diocese. In it, Bishop Bruno explained how, after ten years of litigation, all issues with the four parishes that attempted to break away from the Episcopal Church have now been resolved and the litigation has been successfully concluded. All these properties are now again under the ministry of the Episcopal Diocese of Los Angeles, and legal precedent was established so that in the future vestries cannot vote for the parish church to break away from the Episcopal Church. The decision will have lasting impact on the future of the Episcopal Church. In his letter, Bishop Jon reminded us of the importance of humility as we move into the future. Our ministry should always reflect mutual support even when there are disagreements. Our unity is discovered and celebrated as all of us live out our baptismal covenant.

Gas Leak

The discovery of a leak in the main gas line behind the church led to a major repair project which was carried out by P&M Plumbing Company. A crew of seven workers completed repairs in two and a half days, just in time for the kitchen to be operable for Food in the Afternoon We were very fortunate that the contractor, Frank Howard, donated his time for the project. His generosity saved us \$1800. A thank-you is in order to Tom and Marge England for recommending this plumbing company to us.

Immigration Town Hall in Anaheim

Father Jeffrey Clawson and a number of St. Anselm parishioners attended a Town Hall meeting at Betsy Ross School in Anaheim on May 23rd. Sponsored by OCCCO (Orange County Congregation Community), it was an opportunity for local residents to learn about immigration, their rights, and what legislation Congress is currently considering. OCCCO supports efforts to reform immigration laws and provide pathways to citizenship. The Town Hall was attended by Representative Loretta Sanchez of the 46th District, California, and by Luis Guitierrez of 4th District, Illinois, a noted proponent of immigration reform. OCCCO will hold a Recognition Banquet on June 10, which Father Jeffrey and several members of St. Anselm plan to attend.
